From the Pastor . . .

Dear Friends in Christ,

Later this month our forty day Lenten journey will conclude as we move into the church's holiest season, Holy Week and Easter. The week of worship, prayer, and praise begins on Palm Sunday/The Sunday of the Passion (March 20). On this day we hear the story of our Lord's Passion from the gospel of Luke and we are invited to ponder these holy events which stand at the very heart of our faith.

On Maundy Thursday (March 24) the focus is on Jesus' command that we love one another as he loves us. "Great God, your love has called us here, as we, by love, for love were made" (ELW 358). Loving as we have been loved. This is Jesus' command, the mandate (Latin - *mandatum*) for which Maundy Thursday is named. Our "Journey of Stones" theme will continue with the sermon, "Stones to Bread." We will recall that it was out of love for us that Jesus gave himself in bread and wine to feed and nourish our lives of faith.

Our "Journey of Stones" will conclude on Good Friday (March 25)

with the theme "The Final Stone."

We will revisit a portion of the passion story and remember that when Jesus died and was buried that a large stone was rolled across the entrance to his tomb sealing him off from those who loved him.

"This is the Night!" is the title of our Easter vigil service (March 26). This is *the* night, the night to be immersed in who we are as God's people. This night overflows with biblical images of a world redeemed by Christ and of God's saving activity throughout earthly time. We will celebrate the gifts of grace given to us by our God in Holy Baptism and Holy Communion.

All of this finally culminates on Easter Sunday (March 27), the first of fifty days of celebration of God's victory over sin and death. "Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!" will be our joyful cry. "Christ is risen," these words are the foundation of our faith, the bedrock of our hope, and the glorious good news that we Easter people take out into the world.

Book Review: Thomas Moore, *The Re-enchantment of Everyday Life*

Jesus said, "Unless you become as a small child, you cannot enter the Kingdom of God."

But how does one become a child again without being childish? As adults some of us are not at all enamored with the language of "fantasy"—magic, romanticizing the events of our lives, being full of imagination, trusting the good, treating a lot of life playfully, savoring delight and beauty—basically choosing a rational, logical understanding of "reality" over a child's perspective and, if you will, naïveté.

Thomas Moore invites us into the ethereal dimension of life, and his book serves as a wonderful tour guide to a world ignored only at our peril of losing a sense of joy, wonder, authentic love, and a renewed sense of creativity.

Moore is widely known for his best seller, *Care of the Soul*, but didn't stop there, having published at least 15 more books, fiction and non-fiction. He has been cultivating soul in many ways, having been a Catholic monk, a music composer and artist, a university professor, a psychotherapist, a Buddhist philosopher, a counselor, and one well versed in ancient mythology, especially Greek and Roman. Moore often works with his wife, an artist and yoga instructor.

Essentially, our author is suggesting that re-enchanting the small daily matters and episodes in our lives is a pathway to new life in the spirit.

The Carleton Olsen Library has this and other volumes written by Thomas Moore that may be calling to you.

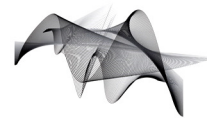

Ponderings from the President ... By Susan Painter

Dying



"I don't want to achieve immortality through my work," Woody Allen once claimed, I want to achieve it through not dying."

The Lenten season is all about dying. Jesus' crucified figure is on our right as we enter the sanctuary. We remember Christ's journey to the cross every Wednesday evening as we make our own way, carrying stones, to the altar.

On Valentine's Day, the *New York Times* book review section was curiously titled "Love and Death." It featured a review of five books exploring our mortality, and the piece was titled, "Life is for the Dying."

Death both fascinates and terrifies us. Books about the end of life and the process of dying rank on the best-seller lists for months, yet we have trouble saying the word itself. As Pastor Ed noted in a recent memorial service, we don't like to "tell it like it is." Instead, we say, "He graduated." "She passed on." "He went into the arms of his Savior." "She crossed the rainbow in the sky." We console ourselves by assurances that our departed member is "in a better place" after "a courageous battle" against disease [is there ever a cowardly battle?]

Our inability to accept our inevitable death also provides an artificial smugness. Tolstoy wrote in his story about the death of Ivan Ilych, "The very fact of the death of someone close to them aroused in all who heard about it, as always, a feeling of delight that he had

died and they hadn't." Writing about the death of Episcopal Bishop William Pike, Stringfellow and Towne are more cynical:

"One of the incidental indignities which the dead must suffer is the condescension of their survivors. Especially at wakes and burials and requiems, the living assume a superiority toward the dead. It is not just that they pontificate; the survivors tend to talk as if they are immortal and have *that* eminent perspective upon life which, obviously, the dead never attained, as proved by their very deadness...It is an odd circumstance, since the dead manifestly have the certain wisdom that there is no immortality."

In *Being Mortal* [a book in our library which Carol Baker gently reviewed for us a few months ago], surgeon Atul Gawande points out,

"Death, of course, is not a failure. Death is normal. Death may be the enemy, but it is also the natural order of things...."

"There's no escaping the tragedy of life, which is that we are all aging from the day we are born."

Gawande compares Western medicine's response to aging with that of his grandfather, who maintained until death his orderly, family way of life on his farm near Mumbai. Rather than being moved to a "retirement community" away from all that was family and familiar, he continued as the focus of those around him. They asked his advice and provided help for

him when needed. There were no "anguished debates" about what to do with him. Our Health Ministry Team will be offering a seminar in a few months about how we age and how we make "end of life" decisions. As we ponder the inevitability of death this season, however, we might take this Lent to be sensitive to among us who are frail, infirm, and aging.

We might offer food, companionship, a phone call or a card to someone who could use a simple gesture of community. We might pray, of course, for strength and dignity as we age. And we might recall that Christ was sent to live among us, preach and perish so we, too, may have eternal life.

It is a weighty concept. But hopefully the lessons of Christ's life will enable us more easily to face our own final journey.
