**Worship at Noon and 7:00p.m.**

Lent begins with a solemn call to fasting and repentance as we begin our journey to the baptismal waters of Easter. As we hear in our reading for the Ash Wednesday service, *"Now is the acceptable time to return to the Lord."* During Lent, we the people of God, will reflect on the meaning of our baptism into Christ's death and resurrection.

## From the Pastor ... Pastor Ed Milliken



Dear Friends in Christ,  
 This year the season of Lent begins in February, so my thoughts have already turned in that direction. Truly, Lent is a hard season to sell. It has a bad reputation and it certainly doesn't fit very well with what many modern people want from their religion. In a time when *entertainment* and *worship* are used in the same sentence, it's difficult to understand what Lent has to offer.

The most common images associated with Lent are images that most people seek to avoid in their lives: darkness, mourning, sorrow, and distress. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday, the sign of the cross darkening our foreheads, and the solemn words ringing in our ears: "*Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return.*" It ends with Good Friday as our Lord is nailed to the cross and becomes one with us in death. This is definitely **not** worship as entertainment!

But the woe of the cross is not the entirety of Lent. To focus on the cross as the only image of the season is to lose sight of the fullness of God's activity among us. The reality is that we Christians know how this story ends and, because of that, our somber observances contain the seeds of celebration. While the cross is an appropriate focus for our reflections, we always see it not simply as an instrument of torture and death, but also as a vehicle of salvation.

So, the tone of Lent is also one of optimism. The first reading on the First Sunday of Lent sounds this note. Following

the Genesis flood, God paints a rainbow in the sky, a sign of God's presence and promise, and life goes on with that assurance. Sunday after Sunday the same theme is presented. A promise is made to Abraham, even though he is apparently too old for it to be kept. Fiery serpents bring death to a disobedient people, but God sends healing – a bronze serpent raised on a pole and, ultimately, Christ on the cross. God rescues his people from their bondage in Egypt and gives them the framework of life in relationship with God and with one another.

Throughout the season, we are reminded that our God has established a covenant, a relationship of love, with us that no force, including sin and death, can ever overcome. On the Fifth Sunday in Lent, Jesus speaks of a grain dying in the earth as an image of his death and resurrection. Christ is the seed fallen to earth, a planting that yields a harvest of life, health, and salvation. Christ is the one who accompanies us in our baptismal death and raises us to new life in him.

During the season of Lent our prayer will be that God will create in us clean hearts and make us strong in faith and in service; that he will renew our hearts, minds, and lives by the Holy Spirit. It may not be entertaining, but our worship will enable us to walk through the wilderness of life in this world proclaiming God's reign of mercy and love as we share in Christ's obedience and in the ultimate victory of his resurrection.

Luther saw firsthand how far removed the gospel was from the people's experience. So, he put together a simple Q&A on the basics of God's word. This was aimed at bringing the Holy Spirit into the hearts of 16<sup>th</sup> century readers, readers ever since, and into your heart as well. Join us each Sunday morning at 9:30 and gain a fresh understanding of how Luther's life and thought is revealed in the Small Catechism, breaking open the proclamation of the gospel to transform our lives with the freeing good news of God's gracious love.

## WELCA News . . . by Pastor Ed

This month the WELCA group will continue a study entitled, "Multiple Meanings: Learning from Other Interpretations." The study, which explores what Biblical stories mean to people around the world, is written by Dr. Mark Allan Powell a professor of New Testament at Trinity Lutheran Seminary in Columbus, Ohio. He has also taught at seminaries in Estonia, Russia, and Tanzania.

On February 21st at 12:30p.m. the topic will be from Luke 3:3-17, "Prepare the Way of the Lord." Dr. Powell writes: "In part two of this study we continue to explore how we identify with the characters of the Bible and how we discern what a story means to us based on those characters. Here we look especially at Luke 3:3-17 and the preaching of John the Baptist to explore how people do not always mean the same thing when they say something is powerful."

## Ponderings at Page Seven ... by Susan Painter

### First Commandment



I am honored to continue to serve Atonement as Vice President. Our new Congregation President, Linda Kilbride, and others have encouraged me to keep sharing a monthly column. Our creative and patient editor, Raynette Rawls, continues to provide a place for me on Page Seven. So, grateful for your interest and hoping that my thoughts can spur reflection, I will keep Pondering on Page Seven.

The Adult Forum begins this year with a study of Luther's Small Catechism - a volume of the most essential beliefs of our church. When I first examined it closely during a college religion class, I found parallels in my study of the Bill of Rights in a political science course. Both the Ten Commandments and the Bill of Rights seemed a long array of exceptions surrounding a set of basic truths.

The First Commandment, in Lutheran and Roman Catholic tradition, has three parts: "I am the Lord your God. You shall have no other gods before me. You shall not make for yourself an idol." The First Amendment in the Bill of Rights provides that there shall be "no law respecting an establishment of religion" or prohibiting its free exercise or abridging freedom of speech or of the press.

My husband, a newspaper reporter, always said that freedom of speech and the press [and religion] were most important, and that is why the founders put it first. Perhaps God placed the First Commandment first, because it is most important.

Exceptions to and distortions of the First Amendment surround us: ICE agents try to break the sanctuary of churches; an Astoria art gallery's Facebook account is shut down when nude photographs appear in an exhibit; national leaders threaten lawsuits against reporters and rant about "fake news."

And what of the First Commandment? We remember concepts more easily in threes, as trilogies. God figured this out first:

"**I** am the Lord your god." [Just me. No others.]

"You shall have **no other** gods before me." [None. Zero. Nada.]

"You **shall not make** for yourself an idol." [In case you **still** don't get it!]

As one astute parishioner said during last week's discussion, this is a concept that frees us. We need not look for idols or other gods to worship. There is ONE to whom we give our selves, our possessions and our very lives.

But **do** we? Our lives are filled with idols and other gods. Work absorbs our waking hours. Money worries keep us up at night. "Things" take over our lives.

Perhaps the most insidious, seemingly innocent, idol is our electronic devices. They get pulled out and examined during musical performances, store check-out lines and even worship services. Sometimes they even **ring** at awkward times.

Researchers find many couples struggle to balance their love for each other with love for their iPhones and Androids.

"Phubbing" is a new term used for snubbing a partner in favor of checking something on a phone. \* Even when the device is not in use, it signals on a counter top that **IT** and its source of content is more important than the live person across the table.

We should each set aside one hour a day to be "device-free." Turn off the television, the iPhone, the computer, the iWatch, the ear plugs. Use that brief space in time to pray; to meditate; to write a personal note of thanks, consolation or just warm thoughts to brighten a day. Even better, use that hour in service to a neighbor, to our community, to the church. Perhaps that will bring us a step closer to Christ's most important commandment: to love the Lord your God with all your heart and all your soul and all your mind...and your neighbor as yourself.
