From the Pastor ... Pastor Ed Milliken



Dear Friends in Christ,

Later this summer the lectionary that we follow for scripture readings presents a challenge that most pastors dread. On Sunday, July 29th we begin five Sundays where the gospel reading is from the sixth chapter of John, the so-called "Bread of Life" discourse. Five Sunday sermons about bread? Now that's a challenge! I have about two and a half.

John 6 begins with the story of Jesus feeding thousands of people using only a little boy's lunch: five loaves and two fish. The lesson: what we have, what we bring to the table, often seems like it is not enough to meet all the pressing needs we see around us. But it is not the adequacy of our supplies or our skills that finally make the difference: it is the power of Jesus working in the littlest and the least to transform this world into the world God desires, a world where all the hungry are satisfied.

The story continues on August 5th and we see that apparently many were not satisfied by Jesus' feeding miracle and they demand to see more. "Show us more, Jesus" they say." Show us a sign so that we can believe in you." As always in John's gospel when people want a sign, Jesus offers himself. "I am the bread of life," he told them, "And whoever believes in me will never be hungry." He is the bread come from heaven to give life to the world. He calls us to come and believe in him and, through that relationship, to know the one who sent him.

We see on August 12th that the people

were confused and alarmed by Jesus' words and they grumble against him. "Who does this guy think he is?" they exclaim. "Isn't this Jesus, the son of Joseph and Mary? How can he say such outlandish things?" But Jesus isn't through leading them deeper into the truth. He goes on to tell them, "I am the living bread that came down from heaven. Whoever eats of this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give for the life of the world is my flesh."

Now this statement really set the people off as we will see on August 19th and 26th. "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" they cry. But Jesus didn't back down. "Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood have eternal life and I will raise them up on the last day; for my flesh is true food and my blood is true drink" he continued. Now even some of his followers are appalled and begin to turn away from him. "This is a hard saying," they cry, "Who can accept it?" So Jesus turned and asked the twelve, his closest followers, "Do you also wish to go away?" And then Peter gives the declaration of faith that is the point of this long story – for them and for us: "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. And we have come to know that you are the Holy One of God."

In all the hard time places of our lives, may we join him in that confession of faith and trust!

Do you have a longing – to have an impact, to make a difference, and to be part of something larger than yourself? Have we got a deal for you?

Atonement's Mission is to "Reach Out With God's Love." With that focus, a desire and vision for a better world and our role in building it, we are motivated to serve.

Our recent Congregational survey indicated that we have desire to give of the gifts God has given us – time, talent, resources – and broaden our social ministry to the community. In addition, we were encouraged to expand our outreach, to act on our commitment to helping neighbors and serving in new ways.

Following our Adult Forum spring series, "Partners in Service," we learned about six of the many social service organizations in our community - their missions and their needs! Guest speakers made hour-long presentations from each of the following: Olalla Center, Habitat for Humanity, Samaritan House, Foster Parents, HELP for the homeless, and Mental Health & Addiction Services of Lincoln County. We learned so much!

"God's work. Our hands!" – ELCA has dedicated September 9, 2018 as a designated day of service – to do various service projects in addition to those we already do – Randy's Read and Feed, Stone Soup, and the community garden for Newport Food Pantry to name a few.

We wish to tie these together, sharing God's love to our communities, and to make an Atonement impact! We will build teams to complete one or two projects. Your Church Council overwhelming voted to support this coordinated single-day effort along with a celebration of our ongoing volunteer projects.

HERE ARE A FEW IDEAS, each requiring a team:

- ◆ Offer to paint a room or two in the new Habitat for Humanity duplex being constructed across from the Newport pool (our paint crew has experience!);
- ◆ Spend some time with folks at Oceanview (maybe a couple of hours playing board games) or singing favorite hymns;
- ◆ Weed the yard of one of our elderly neighbors, paint their front door;
- ◆ Outreach of some kind to our Spanish speaking neighbors;
- ◆ Volunteer in our garden beds tending vegetable for Newport Food Pantry.

We are open to other project suggestions! Each idea will need some research, contact with an involved organization, and coordination of timing, gathering of tools and materials needed, and teambuilding at Atonement.



There will be a signup sheet on the Bulletin Board for you to LIKE an idea suggested here, have one of your own, and/or volunteer for a team). We can do this!

Habitat for Humanity ... Anne Stangeland

A Short History of Habitat for Humanity in Lincoln County

Habitat started building houses for low income families in Lincoln County 20 years ago. In that time, it has built 16 homes with two more now under construction. These should be completed early next year. Families must qualify for a house and if they are chosen, they must contribute 500 "sweat equity" hours helping to build it. All other work is done by volunteers in the community.

Houses have been built in Lincoln City, Toledo, Siletz and South Beach. This is the first time houses have been built in Newport because the City of Newport generously donated the land. When scrip is sold (in the form of a credit card at Fred Myer) five cents of every dollar goes to Habitat of Lincoln County. It is sold the first two Sundays of every month after both services at the table closest to the office. Cards may be purchased in 50 or 100 dollar amounts.

The next time you buy scrip, be aware that you are helping continue a tradition that allows families to purchase their first home.

Who Am I ?

Last month, I took a long journey to the Midwest and East coast for my college reunion and visits with family. The reunion involved not only reconnecting with friends and making new ones, but also some challenging discussion groups. At one, an alumna posed a question to "the young lady on the panel." Students in the audience immediately took him to task for assuming she is a "lady."

To the surprise of most of us [any older than 30, at least] in the group, we learned that visual assumptions about gender and identity are unacceptable. Professors at my college routinely begin a semester by asking what name a student prefers and what pronouns [he/she/they; him/her/theirs] should be used. Indeed, I learned later, a college in Seattle provides buttons for each student and faculty member to simplify this process.

I thought back to my own young adult years when the only identity issues we faced were those of a surname: keep a birth name at marriage? Hyphenate it? Assume the surname of a partner? I once published a paper without a last name, but after a judge told me using "Susan Elizabeth," just "sounds like you've joined a convent," I stopped that practice.

Today's identity issues go far beyond names, back to assumptions made at birth by doctors looking only at some anatomical features. At what age is a child able to articulate his or her gender identity; at what point may he or she decide to resist that initial identity? How far and at

what point should health care and public institutions endorse these changes?

Concerns are much broader than simple assignments of labels on restroom doors. Folks born with physical characteristics mismatched to their psychological and emotional gender suffer confusion, isolation, and despair as they come to terms with the dissonance between who they are and "rest of the world" expectations.

Home in Newport, I learned that our own County Commissioner, Claire Hall, is "transitioning" from her old life as a male. Her decision to be public about the process and the journey to this point is both courageous and controversial, but Professor Judith Hoch, who taught gender roles at the University of New Zealand for many years, says Claire is "just part of history."

Professor Hoch, an artist and anthropologist, says that behavior is grounded in culture. In Figi and French Polynesia, gender can easily be "remade:" when women have several sons but no daughters, they have an option to raise a "son" as a daughter. In those circumstances, s/he is dressed, given jobs and treated as a girl and, when grown, can care for her parents and family. The child may also choose this option, Hoch says, and "no one thinks about it one way or the other."

History gives us examples of women passing as men to join the service or writing under a man's name to allow publication, reinforcing the reality that these roles and gender assignments are culture-based.

We are all created in God's image. How we describe that earthly image matters

With the Relay For Life (RFL) quickly upon us, it is time for luminaria dedications and team/walking sign ups for the August 4th Event. A member of Atonement will be available after both services to either sign people up or show them how to sign

themselves up to be on the team, as well as sell luminarias (be patient, there's more below on that. Don't skip to it!). If people choose to walk they either need to sign up as a team member or sign a waiver for liability purposes (which is also available at the RFL table).

Waivers can also be signed at the event itself. Luminaria dedications will be our sole fundraiser this year. The reason for this is that they represent why the Relay For Life is necessary, and why we at Team Atonement take part: our loved ones. Luminarias are one of the highlights of the RFL as they are a great way to honor or

memorialize loved ones who have battled cancer. Luminarias consist of a decorated white bag with a can of food that serves as a 'stabilizer' and 'stand' for either an electric tea light or glow sticks (the RFL committee is experimenting to try and give the event a colorful glow). The cans of food will be donated to the Lincoln County Food Pantry after the event.

Luminarias can be purchased for \$10 through July 29th. You may take the bags home to decorate, decorate the bags at the church, or ask one of the team members to decorate for you. (Just let us know when you purchase the bags!) Sample decorated bags will be on hand so that you can get an idea for decorating or sample what a team member can do for you! July 29th is also the last day to turn in luminarias. You may turn them into the volunteers running the table or into the mailbox of Tami Johnson.




