Did You Know by Pastor Jane Baker



That large white candle in the sanctuary is called the Paschal Candle?

The term *Paschal* comes from the Latin word *Pascha*, which came from the Hebrew word *Pesach*, which, in Hebrew means "Passover," and correlates to the Paschal mystery of salvation. This candle is also called the "Easter candle" or the "Christ candle."

Paschal, in Judeo-Christian terms, means pertaining either to Easter (the Pascha) or to its forerunner, the Hebrew Passover. In the Old Testament, God's Passover resulted in the gift of freedom to the Hebrew people from their Egyptian masters.

On Maundy Thursday of Holy Week, the entire church is darkened by extinguishing all candles, symbolizing the darkness of a world without God. For churches that celebrate the Easter vigil on the night of Holy Saturday the ceremonial lighting of the Paschal candle is one of the most solemn moments of the service.

A new Paschal candle is blessed and lit every year at Easter, and is used throughout the Easter season of the liturgical church year, as well as on special occasions such as baptisms, funerals, some feast days such as The Baptism of Jesus, and All saints day, and during the seasons of Christmas and Epiphany. With the advent of oil-refillable-Paschal candles, a "new" one is not necessary every year.

At the opening of the Easter Vigil a "new fire" is lit and blessed. The Paschal candle is the first candle to be lit, representing the light of Christ coming into the world. This represents the risen Christ (light &life) dispelling darkness (death). During the Easter service the candle is lit, reminding the people of the

light of Christ's resurrection overcoming the darkness of the tomb. Therefore, the Paschal candle is a symbol of Christ rising from the dead to be the Light of the World.


The Paschal Candle is kept near the baptismal font because it is used during the Liturgy of Baptism. It is lit during baptism to signify the presence of the Holy Spirit. During the baptismal rite, a small lit candle is given to the newly baptized, with words: "Let your light so shine before others, that they might see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven." (Matthew 5:16).

The Paschal candle is also lit and placed near the casket or urn during funeral and memorial services, signifying the hope of the resurrection into which Christians are baptized.



from the Pastor

Most of us, at one time or another, find it difficult to pray, either because we are angry at God, distracted by our busyness, filled with guilt, unsure of how to pray, or a host of other reasons. But most of us sense a deep need and hunger for a more profound, intimate connection to God through prayer. Often we don't even know what words to use. I commend the Psalms to you as a way to jumpstart your prayer life.

According to Ellen Davis, in her book *Getting Involved With God*, "The Psalms are the single best guide to the spiritual life currently in print. They will likely still be on the shelf long after everything else in the spirituality section of the bookstore has gone out of print." I think she is right. Just about anything you could learn from the other books is already there, at least in bite-sized pieces, in the Psalter.

You might be thinking: but some of those Psalms are about being mad at God. Maybe we shouldn't think things like this: we must have already forgiven our enemy before God will listen to our prayer. Or, since we are a people of hope, there is no place for despair or fear in the Christian life. Or this thought: (which has probably squelched more prayer than any other) You must never, ever be mad at God. But we cannot have an intimate relationship with someone to whom we cannot speak honestly—that is, someone

to whom we can show our unseemly side. It's the same with our relationship with God. That is what the Psalms are about. The Psalms are a kind of First Amendment for the faithful. They guarantee us complete freedom of speech before God, and they give us a detailed model of how to exercise that freedom.

The Psalms are not all rhapsodies of praise, proclaiming that God is enthroned in heaven and all is right with the world. Many of them accurately suggest that there is a great deal wrong with the world and they demand that God do something about it! Take, for instance, the psalmist's pious wish that his enemies would melt like a slug on a hot road (Psalm 58:8). Yet, they still come to us as the Word of God.

The Psalms are formulated as prayer—as human words to God, yet because they are part of the Bible, we understand them as God's word to us—or better, the Psalms are God's word *in* us. To paraphrase Paul in the letter to the Romans (8:26), the Psalms are the Spirit of God speaking through us, helping us to pray when we do not know how to pray as we ought, which is most of the time.

In these turbulent and uncertain times we need to be praying. Give the Psalms a try. They are a gift to us. God will be there to listen and to speak, and God will bless your time together.

Practicing Resurrection in Poland

when Dick, Bill Sharp's long-term running bud-

dy, planned travel to Poland to help with Ukraine relief, Bill said "yes! Me too!"

When Dick asked Bill to gather first aid packs, refresh his CPR and AED training and ask for donations to the effort, Bill said "yes."

After the 20 hour flight across the world to Przemysl, when World Central Kitchen asked them to make sandwiches from 9 am to 8 pm every day, Bill said "yes."

Bill is my colleague, a lawyer from Eugene. For the past three weeks, he and Dick helped serve delicious food created by "great and some well-known chefs" in Poland. In the first couple of weeks after the brutal Russian attack on Ukraine, Przemysl, a city of about 66,000 people near the border, welcomed over 350,000 through the town to buses and trains and a different, uncertain life. day, "spurred on by great rock music," Bill and his companions labored in repurposed warehouses to label, organize and serve soup and sandwiches to grateful and gracious Ukraine people invited for a meal...or several.. for as long as they wanted or needed to stay. They served about 500 to 1200 Ukrainians each day.

When Pawel, the owner of an electric supply company who was also working at the Kitchen, invited Bill to help him make deliveries at the border crossing, Bill said yes, it was one of the places he wanted to go. There, they saw people who had walked many, many miles. It was cold and raining, but Bill observed, "The main thing to see was: joy, smiles, soldiers picking up bags for those

fleeing and carrying them through all the aid tents until they could reach a bus." Bill found the Polish people "heroic on many levels." The soldiers walked humbly with refugees, patiently waiting as they stopped at any aid tent, carrying the suitcases, "the best examples of public servants."

When Bill and Dick met the president of the city, personally delivering humanitarian supplies throughout western Ukraine, and realized how much he could use the AED, dental supplies, major-trauma EMT backpacks and clothes they had brought along, they said "yes," and gave him all they had.

When Dick tested positive for Covid and had to leave, going to Krakow for treatment, Bill of course said, yes, he would carry on their efforts. At the front-door tent in the town's train station, Bill met more than 300 Ukrainian people. Despite "being rousted from their homes by a criminal of historic dimensions," the people were overwhelmingly "polite, patient, gracious and appreciative... truly nice Beautiful people with beautiful people. kids. As they take our sandwiches, they take our soup, they thank us and they even smile. I say, 'you're welcome' in my few words of Ukrainian. Boy, are they welcome!"

When a Ukrainian teenage girl offered to help label and sort the sandwiches, Bill said "yes," even though he knew he was bending the rules. When she told him her dreams of becoming a doctor, Bill exchanged contact information as she departed and offered to help. And when a Makin' Waves May 2022


