ear Church,

September marks the turning when the cycle of summer gives way to fall. Things still bloom those black berries are only now starting to ripen, and yet the full force of fall with winter in its wings is right behind it. And if almost on gue our lectionary readings take a turn as well. The last Sunday in August, we had Peters great Confession, "You are the Christ the Son of the living God." We might miss this if our only exposure to the Gospel account comes through our lectionary, but this text is a turning point in the Gospel of Matthew, from now on the story will lead to the cross. There is really nothing in the first part of the Gospel that indicates this, nothing in this story of a Messiah born in a manger, the great wisdom of the sermon on the mount, the calming the storm and walking on water. None of these stories would lead one to the conclusion that the Messiah must die. But, then we have this great confession of Peter, he has seen these stories and reaches the right conclusion, "You are the Christ," and then and only then does the world turn. Jesus tells them that he, "MUST, go to Jerusalem and undergo great suffering, be killed, and on the third day be raised." That is quite the list of musts, each one seeming intractably linked to the other and all heading to the third day.

We must head into September, which will lead to winter, we must all age from the days of our youth, we must all journey in life with hardships and pain. This is our journey, but we live it now knowing that the third day has already happened to Christ and because it happened to him, it will happen to us. "For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life will find it." Only by learning to let go of the temporary things that don't last, do we learn to embrace the eternal things that endure. This is our journey of the fall and if we let the wisdom of our church guide us during this transition period, it will lead us to the light of God being a child that guides our way. The Light which comes on the longest nights of the year. For we must go to Jerusalem, die, and on the third day rise again. All this we must do, the last part as much as the first, and we do this through the love of God poured out for us in Christ Jesus our Lord.

We hope you will enjoy browsing through the books we have on display!




Book Review ... by Patty Fox

Contemplative Knitting by Julie Cocora

 \mathcal{H} ave you ever thought of scheduling part of your day for knitting and to incorporate prayers while knitting? The author is an Episcopal priest and an avid knitter who compares the knitting of each stitch to repetition of prayer as a way for us to be united with Christ.

With 53 million people (women and men) that know how to knit she explores the time knitting, being relaxed, and living in the moment to be an ideal time for prayer. It's not always easy to carve out time to sit still each day and pray so the author explores knitting as a tool to lead us into contemplative prayer. Knitting and prayer is good in your private life but it's also a way to build relationships, lean on one another, and to promote community. It may be uncomfortable to invite someone into your church but it's relatively easy to invite someone into a knitting group! The author makes it clear that contemplative knitting might be easier if you are just learning the stitches because your focus is on what is in front of you.

If you have some patience, knitting can slow you down and help calm you. If knitting is new for you then you could feel helpless and wonder where to turn for help and understand that you are not in this alone. In comparison, contemplative prayer will quiet your mind, require you to ask questions, and open your heart to the presence of God. My thought is to give it a try and see what happens.


