Pastor John Smithies

It is a cold and stormy day as I write this. The promise of spring to come feels very distant. Such anxiety was more intensely felt by our ancient ancestors, for whose very survival rested on the coming of spring. Winter stores would be running low and life itself would be hanging in the balance. Would the sun and new edible life come again, or would food run out. This was the drama and dance every year. And such is the cosmic cycle with its symbols of seasons.

It is no wonder in the mystery of God's wisdom that it was in the Spiring in this precarious moment for human society balancing between life and death, that God called Moses to come and lead the nation out of bondage so that they could worship God in the desert. And it is no wonder then that when God sent Jesus the son into the world to set us free from sin and death in order to worship God in Spirit and truth, that it is at the same time. The same time as Spring, the same time as the Passover. For it is the same drama, the same story that we all have. The dance where God transforms death into life. As the darkness of winter begins to give way to the warmth of Spring, we proclaim that on the cross God had overcome the winter of death and the spring of resurrection life is yet ahead. Such is the wisdom and mystery of God that even the seasons speak of the miracle of God's liberating love. As we journey in Lent, we also journey in the midst of the cold long days of winter still heavy on us, but with the hope and assurance that Spring will come.

We know that heaven and earth are filled with the glory of God and the rocks cry out and sing praises. We are pulled along in the divine drama of cold night giving way to the warmth of the Sun, a symbol of the warm light of the life of God given to us through Jesus Christ. Winter is still here, but spring is coming. Every year we have this cycle, every year we wait, every year spring comes. It is this same rhythm that we say in our Liturgy, "Christ has died, Christ has risen, Christ will come again." Something has happened, Christ came, lived and died for us. Something is happening, Christ is risen, and now we live in Christ Jesus whose resurrection life lives in us. The presence of Christ is real and alive in us. And Something will happen, Christ will come again. God who is at this very moment working for the redemption of all things will come in the fullness so that all may be reconciled back to God. We sit in the cosmic winter while death still reigns, but we look towards the coming of God's glory through Christ to a world of eternal and cosmic spring. This is our journey in hope, this is our journey in Christ.





You're invited to join us for a good and lively discussion of the Lectionary Text at Adult Forum every Sunday at 9am. We meet for about 45 minutes in study, prayer, and discussion. ent is here and Easter is almost upon us. But before we get to easter we have the Lomost sacred week of the year, and we call it Holy Week. The week starting on Palm Sunday and ending on Easter Sunday. A week that we mark by special services to remember, and by remembering to bring into our lives the meaning and presence of Christ through the story of his final week. Holy Week is a time when we join our hearts, prayers, and actions with the whole church, those who are present, those who have gone before and those who will come after us. There is a statement of Christian unity amidst all of our separations that we all hold this week as sacred, and we all have services which are marked by the same central themes and actions. On the Great Vigil we will sing songs that have been sung since the 4<sup>th</sup> century, we read readings that everyone reads on this night. The whole week is a microcosm of those moments. We pause in the midst of the busy week to remember what God has done, what God is doing, and that God complete this process that we call redemption. I invite you all to participate in the movements of Holy Week. Lent officially ends on Maundy Thursday as we gather that night in the movement of washing clean and a meal. We continue that service on Good Friday as we recall the final night and day of Jesus, only to continue the following evening in the Easter Vigil. Then we complete the journey together on Easter Sunday to proclaim together with the whole church that Christ is risen indeed. After Service you are invited to join us for easter brunch in the fellowship hall. All three services are truly one service, all three tell the one story and we dwell in all of them with the mystery of God's love for us. But feel free to come to all or any of them each one speaks of who we are in Christ and the hope that is to come. May Holy Week be for each of us a time to be renewed in the hope of the Gospel.

#### ALC HOSTS EARTH SUMMIT ... by Susan Painter

On Sunday afternoon, February 4<sup>th</sup>, Atonement Lutheran Church served as a local hub for the Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon's 11<sup>th</sup> annual Oregon Interfaith Earth Summit occurring throughout Oregon. Gathering under the theme, "Hope for Our Common Home," participants joined the

meeting virtually from Bend, Dallas, Eugene, Medford, Pendleton and Portland. All were united with a goal to create hope for our common home, the earth.

Atonement's Pastor John Smithies opened the gathering with a prayer, following which the plenary session on Zoom covered a range of topics. Soto Zen priest Domyo Burk noted that, unlike indigenous people, those who emigrated to this country have historically not been intrinsically connected to the land, yet we cannot separate our spiritual lives from that of our earth. Rev. Bonnie Tarwater described her faith prayer garden in Dallas and the process of creating an "earth crisis support group and potluck party."

Members of the Bend-based Interfaith Solar Campaign outlined help that group can offer to install solar panels on church rooftops, not only diminishing the building's carbon footprint but also demonstrating to the community a commitment to climate sustainability. Rep Khanh Pham explained her sponsorship of HB 4083 in Oregon's legislature, a measure directed toward phasing out our reliance on fossil fuels. Echoing those concerns, Senator Jeff Merkley and Dan Serres, a director of Columbia River keeper, described the regressive effects of the planned GTN Express Pipeline project and the currently successful effort to resist it.

Finally, members of Oregon Citizens for an Environmental Rights Amendment made their first public presentation through this forum. Melanie Martin, Susan Heath and Peter Fargo, leaders of this new, nonpartisan coalition outlined the legal and moral justifications for their measure which would amend the Oregon Constitution to provide human rights for us and our children to a healthy environment with clean air, safe water and a stable climate. They are, the group asserted, "people of faith getting together to do the right thing."

Following a Climate Vigil with candlelight, four local groups shared information about their work toward healing and climate resilience in the Lincoln County community. The Lincoln County Long Term Recovery Group described its mission and its successes. The Surfrider Foundation outlined its beach clean-up efforts and water quality monitoring. Natalie Schaefer, Executive Director of the Yakona Nature Preserve and Learning Center shared the history and preservation work of Newport residents Bill and JoAnn Barton's in their 400 acre forest. The area is the ancestral home of the native Yaqo'on tribe and is now a refuge for native plants and animals on this sacred ground. Finally, Lexii Galbreath introduced her holistic healing and eco therapy program offering Surf Therapy through Selkie Soul Work in Newport.

The afternoon offered many opportunities for future engagement and collaborative work toward a healthy and sustainable vision for our planet. Atonement looks forward to hosting the group again in outreach next year to the local community.
