Planned Giving Campaign

I have to admit, when it comes to stewardship, I am much like many of my colleagues in ministry: hesitant to talk about money. Why? Probably because of the "golden rule"—I don't particularly like it when someone else asks me for money. My defenses go up, I get suspicious, and I wait for the "pitch." And I certainly don't want to be that person for others.

The result is that we often avoid talking about money altogether. But in doing so, I realize I do you a disservice. Money is an important part of our lives, and like all areas of life, it belongs in the conversation of faith. Stewardship isn't really about money—it is about the heart. It is about our values. As Jesus said, "Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

With that in mind, we have two upcoming opportunities for reflection and conversation:

1. Book Club (September 9th at 11:00 am in the Fellowship Hall)

This month's book club will be a little different. We will read the very short work *Reflections on Faith and Finances* by Charles Lane (copies available for everyone). On the 9th, we'll gather for food, fellowship, and a discussion led by Lisa Higginbotham from the ELCA Foundation, who works with individuals and congregations on stewardship and finances. Even if you haven't read the book, please come for the refreshments and conversation!



2. Estate Planning Basic Rundown

David Cramer, who is a retired trusts and estates attorney, will be available after Worship on September 21st to discuss estate planning and answer your questions.

3. Legacy Giving Workshop (September 28th & 29th)

On Sunday, September 28th, Lisa will be with us in person to lead a discussion on planned legacy giving. Again, this is not really about money—it's about values. The real question is: Can the things I care about now continue to be cared for after I am gone? That's a profound question of faith and legacy, one we should all consider. With thoughtful planning, we can help ensure that the ministries we love will continue for generations to come.

Lisa will also be available all day Monday, September 29th, for anyone who would like a personal conversation. And yes, there will be food and good company on the 28th—if nothing else, come for that!

Let me be clear: these conversations are not intended to pressure anyone into leaving a gift. Rather, it would be a disservice to our congregation not to create space for this kind of reflection with an expert.



September turns, and we hold our breath. Will summer last, or will winter come early? Change always comes—it is an inevitable part of the year. It's hard to watch the seasons shift without also noticing how much our community has changed over the summer. Some of our members have moved away, and others we grieve because the sting of death is still fresh. Yet in the midst of sorrow, there has also been joy: new members, new leadership, new opportunities.

I once attended a training on change. I don't remember much of the material, but one phrase stayed with me: with every change, even good change, there is loss. It is okay to mourn a loss and celebrate a gain at the same time. That feels true in our church. We can hold joy and grief together, just as we hold one another. We live in that delicate balance: life is both beautiful and painful, and community is a place where we can be okay and deeply hurting at the same time.

This balance is also where we find ourselves in the Gospel of Luke. As I mentioned recently, we are in the "journey" section of Luke—a section that makes up nearly a third of the Gospel. Here we see Jesus walking the way toward Jerusalem. One of Luke's central themes is that following Jesus means walking the way of the Lord. May it be, that in watching Jesus walk his way, we may learn how to walk our own.

On this journey, Jesus and his first followers faced constant change. Did the human Jesus know everything that was to come? Scholars have spilled much ink over this question, but in the end, no one can know what Jesus fully understood. What we do know is that change came to him and to his community, and they had to ask: How do we live out the Gospel in a changing world? That is still our question today. Each generation has to reinterpret the eternal truth of the Gospel in its own context. That is the mystery and beauty of Scripture—it continues to speak anew.

God has come to us in Christ Jesus. He has set us free, destroyed sin and death in our flesh, and now, here in Newport, Oregon, at Atonement Lutheran Church, we ask: What does that mean for our lives, right now?

In our community, much has changed, and we are renegotiating our shared identity as a church. We find ourselves in need of musicians and singers, new ministry opportunities are opening before us, and we continue to ask what it means to love our neighbors in a polarized world.

Let me highlight a few of these changes.

First, now that fall is here, I would like us to return to our monthly prayer service with a simple meal at 5:00. I believe this service is important—not just as a reflection of who we are (a community that eats and prays together, rich with sacramental meaning), but also as a witness to the wider world. In an age of machines and AI, the world desperately needs true spaces for human encounter. Atonement, we have that gift. Let's strengthen it, lets expand, let us make room so that as the need increases for true human encounter we have a place where people can come.

But this also creates needs. We miss Marian, who has moved, and we could use additional musicians and singers to help. Singing is one of those things that terrifies me, but I am going to step up and lead some myself. The beauty of resilience is that no one person has to do everything. If you can lead just once or twice a year, that is enough! Together, we will have what we need. If you've been considering this, please talk with me or one of the musicians.

Finally, a new ministry opportunity: Hope Teams. I've written and spoken about this already, but the idea comes from Every Child Oregon. A Hope Team supports a foster family through acts of love and encouragement. The focus is on the whole family unit, so even if you don't feel called to work directly with children, there are many ways to help. People often say that young families are missing from church—but perhaps the deeper question is: *How are we caring for young families?* A Hope Team is one way we can put care into action. As the old wisdom goes: "People don't care what you know until they know how much you care." If this ministry speaks to your heart, I invite you into the conversation as we discern this next step together.

September brings change, as it always does. Our community is changing, too. Above all, we pray that, as individuals and as a church, we are being transformed into the image of Christ. Every day is part of that transformation. May it be so.


