The marking of a new year has always felt like a strange thing to me. There is a kind of arbitrariness to the moment when we say the Earth has completed a full rotation around the sun. We could, in theory, choose any day of the year. Count 365 days, account for the extra hours, and declare that a year has passed. There is nothing inherently special about December 31 that makes it New Year's Eve.

And yet, it is also very special.

We have just passed through the longest night of the year. We have celebrated the birth of Christ, not only in story and song, but in our hearts. It seems fitting, then, that we would stand watch as a new year is born in our midst. This particular night begins to feel like the right night. Something is ending, and something new is beginning.

If even a seemingly random night can carry such meaning, perhaps that helps us understand Martin Luther's understanding of baptism. If we were to look at the dates of our baptisms, they would be scattered across the calendar. The church has tried many times to standardize baptismal dates, and it has never quite worked. Baptism, after all, is not about a date on the calendar. It is about the new life God is continually birthing within us.

In the Small Catechism, Luther writes, "It signifies that the old person in us with all sins and evil desires is to be drowned and die through daily sorrow for sin and through repentance, and on the other hand that daily a new person is to come forth and rise up to live before God in righteousness and purity forever."

The emphasis, I think, is on the word daily. Baptism is something that happens once, and yet it is something that unfolds again and again. One time, and yet always.

As we stand on the threshold of a new year, we stand in that space between dying and rising. These things do not truly happen on December 31 alone. They are cyclical and ongoing, woven into the rhythm of our lives. And yet here we are, invited once more to notice them.

So as this year begins, may we remember that God is still at work, still bringing life where we least expect it. May we return to the waters of our baptism, not to relive a date long past, but to live more fully into the promise that we are being made new day by day. And may that daily renewal shape who we are together, as we seek to deepen our encounter with the holy and to love our community with creativity, courage, and grace.

The Gardening Club is looking for your recycling and for daffodil bulbs!

We have several gardening projects underway that you can contribute to just by looking in your recycling bin! For the pea garden, we are looking for 1L to 2L clear bottles. 1/2 and 1 gallon milk jugs will also work! If in doubt, bring it in! We are collecting these in a bin in Pastor John's office. With these containers, we will be making cloches. With the bottoms removed, these containers will be half buried around the young pea plants, protecting them from wind and slugs while providing extra warmth. We are also looking for non-shiny corrugated cardboard. Leftover shipping boxes from Christmas are perfect. We will be using these to suppress weeds around bulb plantings that we're doing in January in the Memorial Garden. The cardboard will be covered with mulch, naturally suppressing weeds and eventually decaying and contributing to the soil, much in the same way decaying leaves do. Speaking of bulbs, we will be planting daffodils in the Memorial Garden this month. If you'd like to get involved or donate some extra bulbs, please let Emily or Pastor John know.

Camp Lutherwood


Announcing the Annual Meeting of the Camp Lutherwood Association on February 7th!

Atonement Lutheran History And Stories

We are putting together a scrapbook album of our artwork, and stories of Atonement Lutheran (while we still have memories of them!). This is currently a work in progress as we gather information. This month we want to feature our Christmas Angel Trio!

The Christmas Angel Trio Story

My inspiration for creating the three Angels we share at Christmas came from Marion Brown, our dedicated servant of Atonement for many years. She returned from the small German town of Brühl after visiting her daughter and two grandchildren. She attended a Lutheran church at the edge of town during Advent and described to me the three Angels suspended from the ceiling in the tiny Narthex as you enter the sanctuary. I had the privilege of attending worship services there later, but not during Advent, and I never saw their Angels.

The beauty of this imagined scene inspired in me a desire to duplicate this for our church. During several months of planning to choose materials and methods to create our own Angels, I devised a plan to construct our own Christmas Angels. During the planning period, Mary Lou Mate volunteered to decorate the outlines with gold-colored braid and sequins. (more about that later). I had now shared my plan and received support for furthering my quest for materials. It needed to be light weight to be suspended, and create a mobile with nearly invisible supporting structures to enhance the effect of angels flying effortlessly in air.

I chose corrugated white plastic as a light weight material, modifiable by cutting and shaping, and more durable than cardboard or paper. I found the corrugated plastic rectangles in the basement of the University of Oregon bookstore. I chose three angels on Christmas cards that had different profiles to add variety. I used an opaque projector to cast the images on the plastic and created an enlarged outline of each angel that I traced in pencil. The hardest part was cutting. I thought I would be able to use scissors, but the curves and toughness of the plastic made that nearly impossible. Most of the cuts were made with a utility knife and smaller ones with a fingernail clipper, penknife, or surgical scalpel. It took approximately three full days to cut and shape each Angel.

I used solid copper wire as the support for the mobile because it was strong, low luster, and it nearly disappeared in front of the backdrop of our beautiful cedar wood walls. Nylon fishing string was used to secure the angels to the wire and then each string was carefully placed to balance the Angels so they did not touch each other when suspended. It took several hours to accurately position each string and create the exact length of each support wire to get the proper balance. This was a real test for my pernicious lack of patience...a virtue that eludes me.

I have always been a little disappointed in the final appearance. Near the end of my construction I approached Mary Lou and Marion to ask for their help in decorating the Angels with golden braid, fabric, and glitter that we had discussed earlier. They both were adamant that the plain white Angels were lovely AS IS and should not be further adorned. I reluctantly acquiesced to their fervent appreciation of the final product; it has always seemed unfinished to me. They loved them, and I relented. I think Martin Luther might have agreed with them: simplicity triumphs over ostentatious decoration. I suspect these three figures are a fitting physical metaphor for the unfinished nature of my development as a Christian.

The best surprise became apparent shortly after the first rising of the Angels in the sanctuary, They began slowly moving in the thermal currents of the heat vents on the floor below. As they gently danced and turned they reflected light from their surface and softly transmitted light through their translucent bodies. This moving spectacle of changing position and lighting creates a somewhat ethereal presence. So majestic and heavenly, yet peaceful; a delight I had not anticipated!

One of the Angels is a ballerina style dancer that reminds me of my daughter. She took dancing lessons all through her school years while living here in Newport. I haven't assigned names to these three angels: it seems selfish and arrogant; they don't belong to me. My favorite names are Gabriel, Auriel, and Celeste. Feel free to choose your own names to personalize them. They belong to each and all of us.


As a totally unexpected surprise, Pastor Ed Millican provided a blessing for the Angels when they were first presented to the congregation during worship; this was a special Christmas gift for me. I don't remember exactly when they were dedicated: approximately 2015.

I hope as years go by, this angelic trio will inspire the congregation in worship during Advent and Christmas, and remind them of our German Lutheran heritage as well as our angelic connection to a small church in Germany...
